

JAMES PENROSE HARLAND is a classical scholar and archaeologist. Born in New Jersey, he did both his undergraduate and graduate work at Princeton University, with further studies at Bonn and at the American School of Classical Studies in Athens. He served in the United States Navy in ranks from seaman to ensign. In 1922 he came to Chapel Hill. Here, for almost forty years, with wit, learning, and enthusiasm he passed on to his students the excitement of archaeological discovery. He actively participated in archaeological excavations at Nemea, Zygouries, Corinth, and Mycenae. He is the author of The Peloponnesos in the Bronze Age, Prehistoric Aigina, and of other publications. Active both in the University and in the community, Professor Harland served as president of the North Carolina Chapter of the Archaeological Institute of America and as a member of the Chapel Hill Planning Board. Generations of UNC students remember him as their most sparkling teacher. He has been called "a legend in his own time." The University at Chapel Hill takes pleasure in presenting to Professor Harland the degree, Doctor of Letters.
