## November Faculty Council topics include Strategic Framework, diversity in STEM

The next Faculty Council meeting will take place on Friday, November 18, 2016, in Kerr Hall 2001. All members of the faculty are welcome to attend. Chancellor Carol Folt will present a working draft of the University's Strategic Framework.



The Community and Diversity Committee will present Women and Minorities in Stem from Pipeline to Retention: A Conversation with Faculty Council. This panel discussion will bring together faculty and administrators from across campus to discuss efforts to attract women and minorities to (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) STEM fields. Panelists will discuss strategies and programs at Carolina for diversifying and attracting applicants to STEM, efforts at recruiting and retaining a diverse STEM faculty, and campus-wide support networks for women and minority faculty and postdocs. We will also discuss ways that the University is working to highlight the achievements of women and minority faculty in STEM fields.

Professor Andrew Perrin, chair of the Curriculum Review Working Group, will provide an overview of the process for updating the general education curriculum. He will return to Faculty Council in December for a longer discussion.

### Caregivers at Carolina call for applications

The UNC School of Medicine is pleased to announce a call for applications for supplemental research funding for physician scientists who are facing significant extraprofessional caregiving responsibilities through the "Caregivers at Carolina" Program. The UNC SOM is one of only 10 U.S. medical schools to receive this 5-year grant from the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation (DDCF). The Program is specifically designed to help retain physician scientists in research by assisting them to obtain funding for direct research support (e.g., technician time; grant writing support) or buy out of clinical time so that the scientist may maintain research productivity during a transient period when caregiving demands are high. Funding is for up to \$40,000 per year for one year with a possible extension for a second year. Funds may not be used directly for family care. The program will also provide access to mentoring and career development resources.
