



2004 NC IOM Task Force on the North Carolina Nursing Workforce

- Production of prelicensure RNs should be increased by 25% from the 2002-03 graduation levels by 2007-08
- Greater priority should be placed on increasing production of BSN-educated nurses in order to achieve the overall goal of developing a nursing workforce with a ratio of 60% BSN: 40%
- expanded Nursing doctoral programs should be ADN/hospital diploma graduates

Fall Semester Enrollments





BSN-ABSN-RN/BSN Graduations




NCLEX Passing Rates By Calendar Year First time test takers





MSN New Enrollments & Graduations






Student Ethnic/Racial Diversity* by Program Level




Total SON Faculty Headcount & FTE




SON Clinical and Tenure Track Standing Faculty 2008-09

Total Faculty Diversity (Tenure, Clinical and Research Tracks)




Total Student Credit Hours 12 Month Totals - Registrar data





Sources of All External Grant Expenditures 2007-08






