**Report of activities:** (See comparative statistics, attached.)

1. Approved one non-resident admission exemption, if needed, for the Thomas Wolfe Scholarship in recognition that the scholarship seeks to bring prodigious writing talent to the University.
2. Reviewed the forthcoming changes on the SAT, including the addition of a required writing sample. The new exam is required for the entering class of Fall Semester 2006.
3. Given that the ACT test will offer a similar, but optional, writing section, the committee approved a policy to require a writing sample from both SAT and ACT takers for consideration for admission to UNC-Chapel Hill.
4. Endorsed a transfer admission proposal that places emphasis on the prior completion of basic skills and perspectives requirements rather than on the attainment of enough credits to earn sophomore or junior status. The proposal further outlines a comprehensive approach to reading transfer student applications that more closely resembles the comprehensive freshman reading process.
5. Reviewed the Affirmative Action processes of the Office of Undergraduate Admissions in preparation for the pending decision of the Michigan Supreme Court case.
6. Received reports from the Subcommittee on the Admission of Student-Athletes and the Subcommittee for Students with Disabilities (see comparative statistics, attached).

Annual Report  
Subcommittee on Athletics Admissions  
Academic Year 2002-2003

The Subcommittee on Athletics Admissions is encharged with the responsibility of assessing the academic records of those athletes being recruited by UNC-Chapel Hill whose pre-college work and test scores were sufficiently weak as to require careful evaluation regarding their ability to succeed academically at this university. The subcommittee employs certain quantitative criteria to identify those recruits (and potential recruits) who are subject to evaluation. During academic year 2002-2003 the subcommittee continued to use the guidelines developed in previous years. According to these guidelines, a recruit/potential recruit would be considered a "subcommittee case" if he or she:

- made a total SAT score of less than 900 (or ACT equivalent);
- made a Math SAT score of less than 400;
- made a Verbal SAT score of less than 420;
- failed to complete the appropriate pre-college courses normally needed for admission into UNC-Chapel Hill;
- made a GPA of less than 2.5 in "core" high-school courses;
- ranked in the lower half of his/her high-school class.

This year the subcommittee met eight times and evaluated 28 recruits and potential recruits, who fell into one or more of the "at risk" categories outlined above. The subcommittee also discussed two other cases (relating to junior-college recruits) in a special advisory capacity. Technically speaking, such recruits are outside the purview of the subcommittee. It should be noted for the record that most athletes coming to UNC-Chapel Hill as "non-competitive admissions" do not become "subcommittee cases." So-called subcommittee cases constitute but one relatively small subcategory of the stronger "non-competitive admissions" group. As in the past, most subcommittee cases came from football, although the subcommittee evaluated the files of recruits and potential recruits from men's soccer, men's basketball, women's track, and women's tennis as well. The subcommittee declined to recommend for admission two of the 28 recruits/potential recruits subject to its scrutiny; the remainder received positive recommendations, although some of these positive recommendations came with precautionary admonitions and warnings (e.g., a strong suggestion that a particular recruit participate in the Summer Bridge Program, a notation that another needs help in Math or English, or has a foreign language deficiency, or may need to be tested for a learning disability, etc.). A majority of those recommended for admission will in fact attend UNC in 2003-2004, although some of those recruited and recommended for admission by the subcommittee ultimately decided to attend other universities, while others may yet decide to go to a prep school for a "post-grad" year.

From the subcommittee's viewpoint, the most heartening development this year was the hoped-for drop in the number of cases vetted. As *per* last year's report, in fall 2001 the Advisory Committee on Undergraduate Admissions passed a motion to raise the Athletic Department's allotment of out-of-state admission slots from 80 to 100 on a two-year trial basis beginning in fall 2002. The motion was passed with the condition that over time the number of at-risk student-athletes coming before the Subcommittee on Athletics Admissions would decline. We are happy to report that in Year 1 of this trial, "subcommittee cases" did, in fact, drop substantially, from 41 in 2001-2002 to 28 in 2002-2003, a decline of 31.7 percent. The drop was particularly significant in football, and the subcommittee would like to commend Coach John Bunting and the entire football program for their efforts to improve the academic profile of their recruiting class.

By and large, the relationship between the subcommittee and personnel in the Department of Athletics could be characterized as excellent. Athletics Department personnel were quite good about providing us with up-to-date information regarding the files of recruits, and almost invariably tried to comply with our requests for additional materials, records from previous years, testimony from coaches, etc. While there is much to be pleased about this year, the subcommittee would be remiss in its responsibilities were it not to note several potentially troubling issues the university shall soon be facing regarding its athletics programs. First, the NCAA has recently made a number of changes in its initial eligibility requirements. The most troubling from our perspective is the new high-school core GPA/SAT sliding scale, which, under certain circumstances--a core GPA of 3.55 or higher--will allow a student to qualify with a combined score of 400 on the SAT! The upshot of the change is to devalue the weight of standardized tests, which tests have generally proven useful in predicting outcomes of students in their first year of college. The subcommittee hopes that both UNC and the ACC will work to develop some reasonable guidelines regarding these changes. Secondly, the subcommittee would like to note a new recruiting trend that is becoming increasingly common in football in particular: attempts by recruited seniors in high school to graduate in December of their senior years and to enroll in college as student-athletes a month later. Student-Athletes, particularly those competing in fall sports such as football, believe that this gambit will give them a leg up both in adjusting to college and in their athletic careers. In April 2003 the football staff briefed us on this trend, which in its view will become increasingly popular in coming years. Both the Office of Admissions and the subcommittee have some concerns about this trend. Both the Office of appropriate bodies monitor its incidence and effects over time. In closing, let me take the opportunity to thank the subcommittee members, the Office of Admissions (Jerry Lucido, Barbara Polk, and Michelle Johnson in particular), the Department of Athletics (Jerry Lucido, Steinbacher especially), and the Academic Support Center of the Department of Athletics (John Blanchard and Susan Maloy in particular) for their hard work, strong support, and unfailing good humor over the course of an arduous academic year.

**Selecting a Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) for  
The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Re-accreditation**  
Executive Associate Provost Bernadette Gray-Little.

As many of you know, every 10 years the University as an institution is reviewed by a regional accrediting body (SACS) for re-accreditation. There are many legal and financial implications of accreditation that make this *voluntary* process necessary. Moreover, the re-accreditation process, in particular the self-study preparation, can have long-term beneficial effects. In the 1985 accreditation, led by Jack Kasarda, we focused on the University as a research university. I believe this process raised our consciousness regarding the research mission and laid the groundwork for a clear focus on enhancing our research status. The 1995 re-accreditation, led by Darryl Gless, focused on excellence in undergraduate education. It was not accidental that this report was soon followed by the task force on intellectual climate, which led to several new initiatives to strengthen our undergraduate programs.

The structure of the re-accreditation process has been changed during the past two years. For example, SACS has attempted to move away from a re-accreditation process led by a single grandmaster and has, instead, called for development of a leadership team. Our leadership team consists of Chancellor Moeser, Provost Shelton, Vice Chancellor Nancy Sutenfield, Dr. Lynn Williford, Professors Kerry Kilpatrick, Bob Adler, Bobbi Owen, Mark Peifer, and myself.

I am here today as a representative of the leadership team to ask for your guidance about a key element of the self-study process.

There are two major components of the re-accreditation self-study. One is a series of reports that respond to specific questions raised by SACS. There are approximately 70 such reports that will range in length from 1 page to 20 or 30 pages. These reports mostly ask how we address certain processes, how we evaluate them, and how we incorporate the results of our evaluation into planning for greater effectiveness. Groups composed of members of the faculty, staff and administration, and student body will be formed into groups to address these issues. Many of you will be asked to participate.

The second component, and the reason I am here today, is the quality enhancement plan, QEP. The QEP describes a carefully designed and focused course of action that addresses a well-defined topic or (issues) related to student learning. This is the forward-looking part of the re-accreditation. It should describe an area of importance for us, something to which we intend to have an ongoing commitment. The QEP should be associated with ongoing planning efforts. At its best the QEP would have a transforming effect on student learning.

## **SACS Criteria for Selecting a QEP topic**

- 1) Addresses an issue related to **student learning**
- 2) Addresses a **critical, strategic issue**; integrated with ongoing planning process
- 3) Addresses an **issue discovered through assessment**; integrated with ongoing assessment process
- 4) Engages the **wider academic community**
- 5) **Capacity** to implement
- 6) **Executive commitment** for 5+ years

### **Illustrative examples from SACS :**

- Enhancing academic climate for student learning
- Strengthening general studies curriculum
- Developing creative approaches to experiential learning
- Enhancing critical thinking skills
- Introducing innovative teaching and learning strategies
- Increasing student engagement in learning
- Exploring imaginative ways to use technology in curriculum (NC Stare Learning in a technology rich environment)

These examples are mostly focused on undergraduate learning issues, but not exclusively. Our QEP does not need to be limited to undergraduate student learning, but should include it.

**Suggestions from UNC-CH groups.** (Chancellor's Advisory committee, Executive Committee of the Faculty Council, Deans' Council, (discussions with graduate and undergraduate student groups and the employees forum are scheduled)

#### **A. Making Connections:**

This topic uses the title of the proposal for the undergraduate curriculum revision, but includes more. It includes connection across the curriculum, interdisciplinary efforts among faculty to enhance learning and research, and ways in which connections with communities (local, national, and international) can enhance student learning.

#### **B. Explicit focus on internationalization:**

This would include many of the activities and functions embedded in the responsibilities of the associate provost for international affairs, for example.

- Helping to create a long-term plan for making the University a leading international university.
- Generating resources to fund international research, teaching, and service.
- Identifying ways and means for providing resources for international programs.
- Facilitating the coordination of international activities across campus.

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### **C. Innovative Teaching and Learning Strategies**

A QEP focus on innovative teaching would invite an evaluation of teaching and learning strategies throughout all disciplines and levels of instruction with a focus on innovation and effectiveness.

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### **D. Honor and Integrity**

This topic would be a follow up to and expansion of the excellent set of discussions and activities associated with the honor and integrity initiative, including the influence honor and integrity has on the teaching and learning process.

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### **E. Implementing and evaluating the general education curriculum**

We are already engaged in this process. However, our QEP could focus on this very ambitious project with a commitment to study the effects of the new curriculum and to incorporate the findings into continuous improvement of the new curriculum.

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### **F. Developing Undergraduate Research Programs**

Our office of undergraduate research is just about five years old. However, it has already had an important role in cataloguing, celebrating, and raising the profile of undergraduate research in a way that highlights the important work of the faculty and graduate students across the campus. A QEP devoted to this topic this work would make undergraduate research a major focus of university commitment.

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### **G. Nurturing Arts across the curriculum**

The development of the arts corridor, Renovation of Memorial Hall, increased use of the Ackland as resource in teaching by many disciplines, the time may be ideal to ask how Arts might be emphasized in student learning and what are the benefits?

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### **F. Develop a plan to assess growth in student learning over time—**

This topic would include a careful assessment of how students learn and what they learn during their time at Carolina and would attempt to determine the Value Added by a Carolina Education.

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### **G. Carolina as an entrepreneurial learning environment**

We were recently awarded a Kauffman grant to facilitate entrepreneurship in teaching, research, and public engagement; we are developing Carolina North; an increasing number of our faculty are involved in research, evaluation, or teaching efforts that have potential for commercial development, at the same time that they contribute to social and economic wellbeing of the region. A QEP on entrepreneurship would both refine and expand these efforts.

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### **H. Assess impact of University's contributions on state and society**

We often focus on the fact that we are a "public" university. To most of us this means something other than the fact that we receive financial support from the state, it also implies an obligation. How does the University contribute to the state and society? A QEP on this topic would attempt to gauge the tangible and intangible contributions that the University makes through its teaching, research, and public engagement.

**CRITICAL QUESTIONS REGARDING  
SCHOLARSHIPS AND STUDENT FINANCIAL AID  
University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill  
Academic Year 2002 - 2003**

Need-based student financial aid enables qualified students, who otherwise could not afford the cost of college, to attend the University. Merit aid recognizes and rewards student talent and achievement. Both are important sources for the recruitment and retention of undergraduate and graduate/professional students at the University.

The Office of Scholarships and Student Aid, the Office of Institutional Research, and the Faculty Committee on Scholarships, Awards and Student Aid will continue to perform research and examine the following questions:

**A. Questions Related to Campus Planning:**

1. How much financial aid will be needed under differing enrollment growth scenarios, and for whom?
2. How will proposed changes in tuition policy, or subsequent tuition increases, or a decline in the economy, impact the need for additional grant aid?
3. Which types and amounts of aid most effectively influence students to enroll in, persist, and graduate from Carolina?
4. What impact does Carolina's offer of financial aid have on the University's efforts to recruit students of color and first generation college students?
5. What impact does Carolina's offer of merit scholarships and graduate awards have on the University's effort to recruit the highest achieving students?
6. What is the cumulative indebtedness for Carolina's graduating undergraduates, and for graduate and professional students completing programs at the University?
7. How much can undergraduate, graduate, and professional students reasonably be expected to borrow?

**B. Questions Related to the Distribution and Allocation of Aid:**

1. What is the proper balance between:
  - a. need-based and merit aid;
  - b. aid to graduate/professional and undergraduate students;
  - c. aid to in-state and out-of-state students?
2. What are the appropriate relative roles of the student, the family, the institution, the state, and the federal government in paying for one's education? And, to what extent should each party reasonably be expected to contribute?

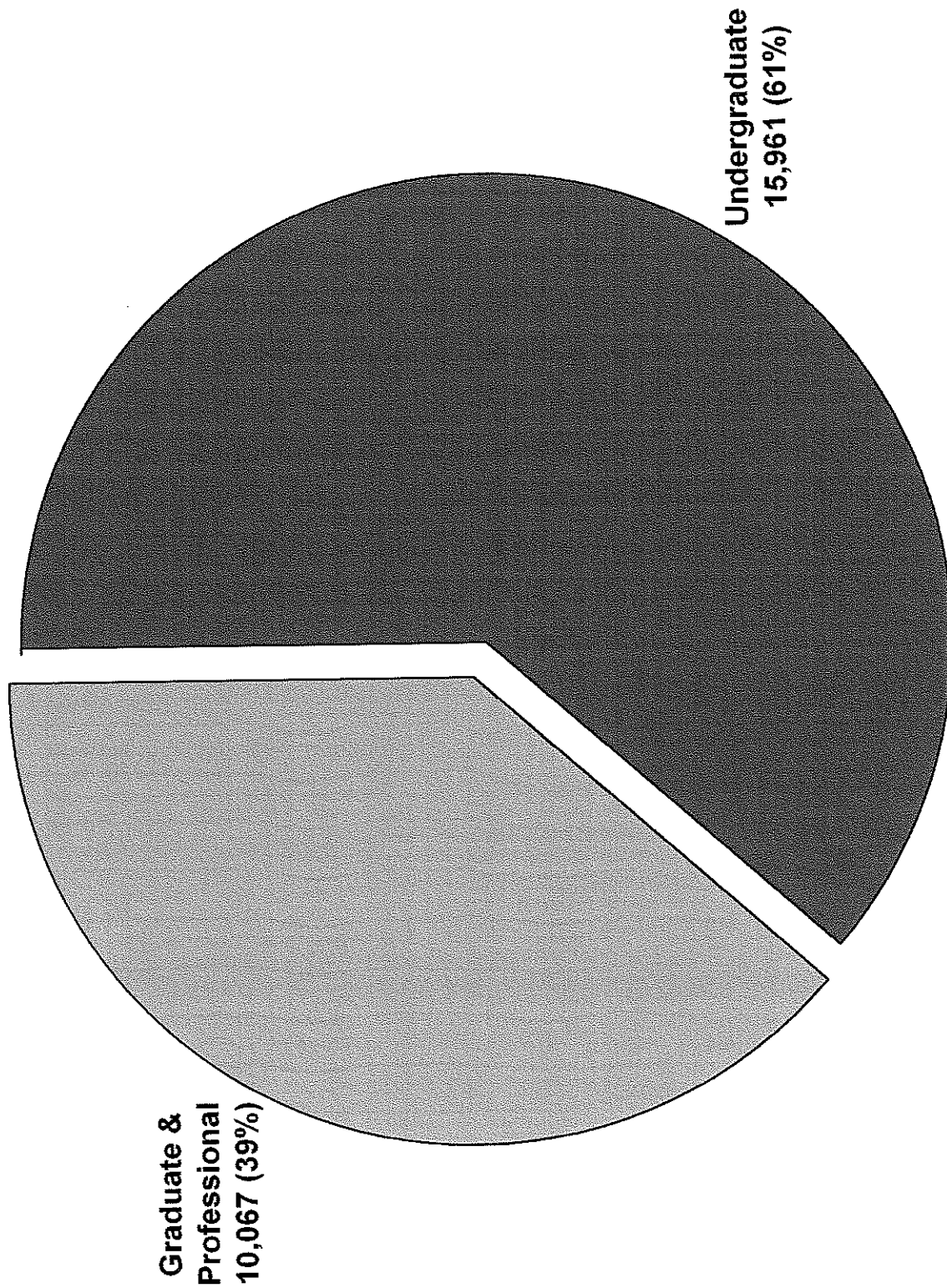

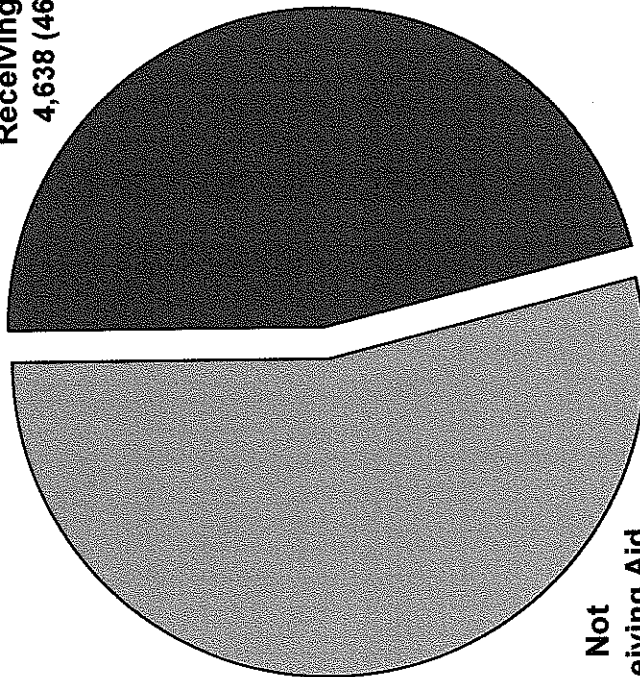

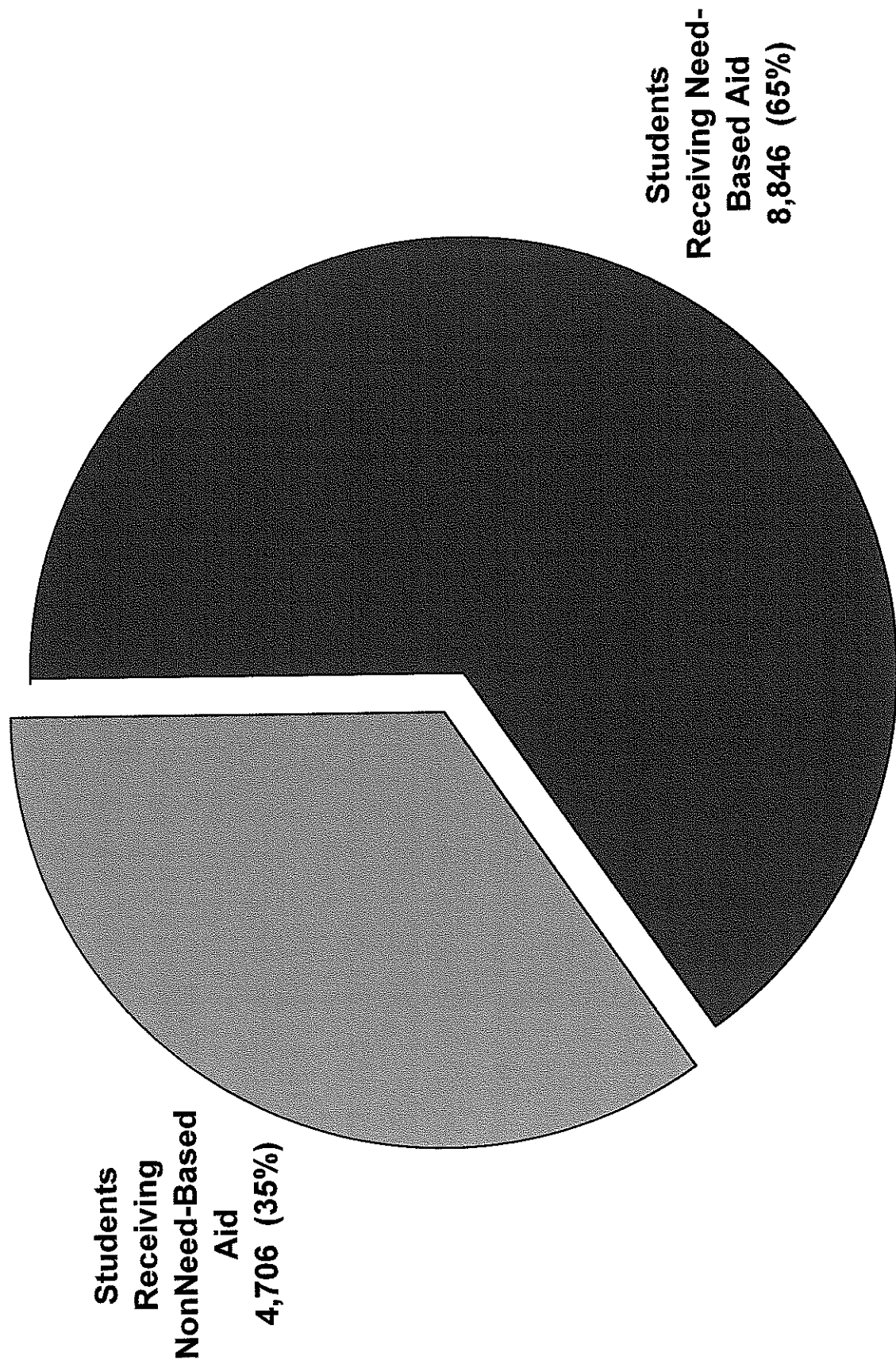

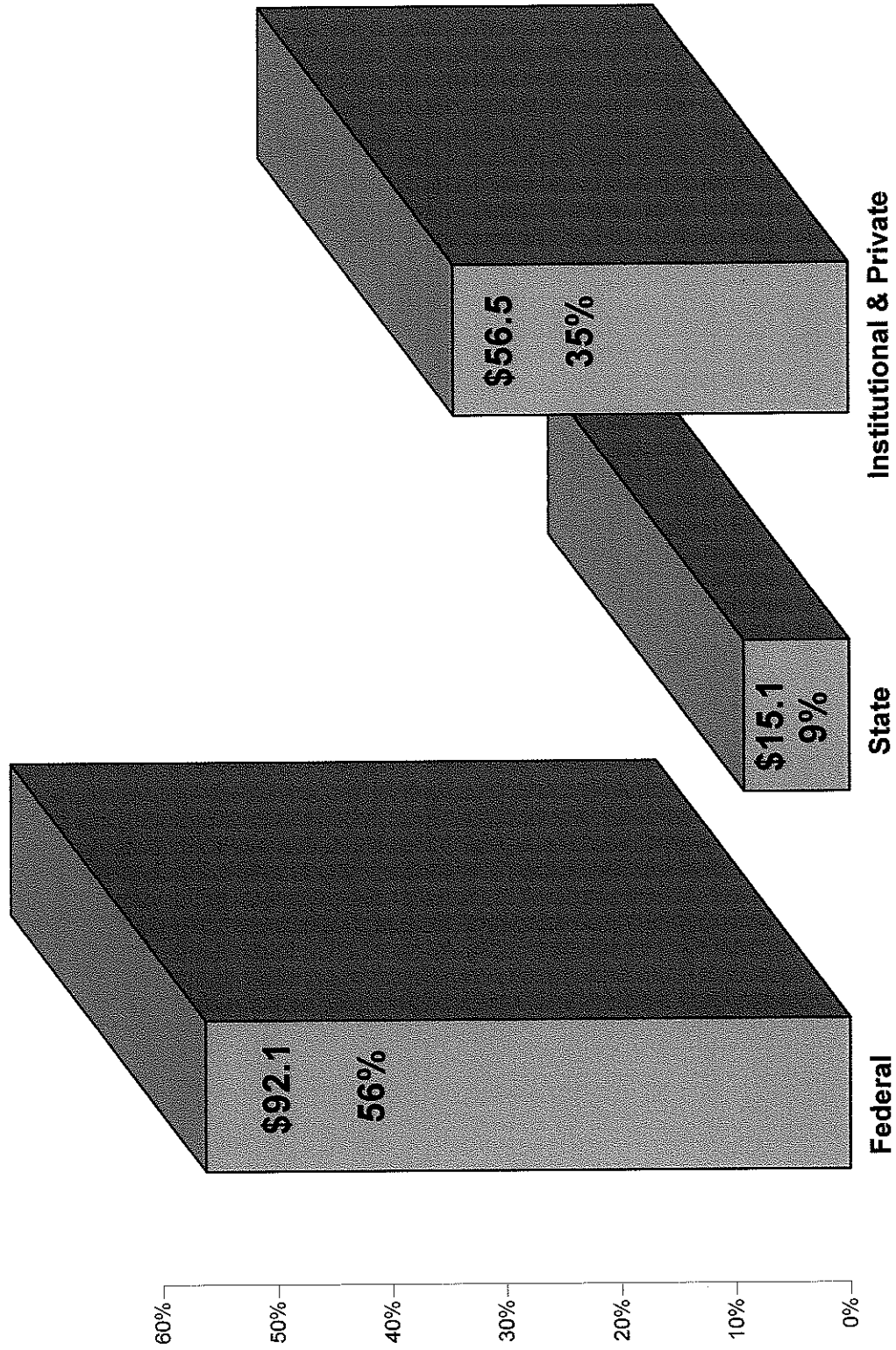
# **All Students Receiving Any Aid 2002-2003**

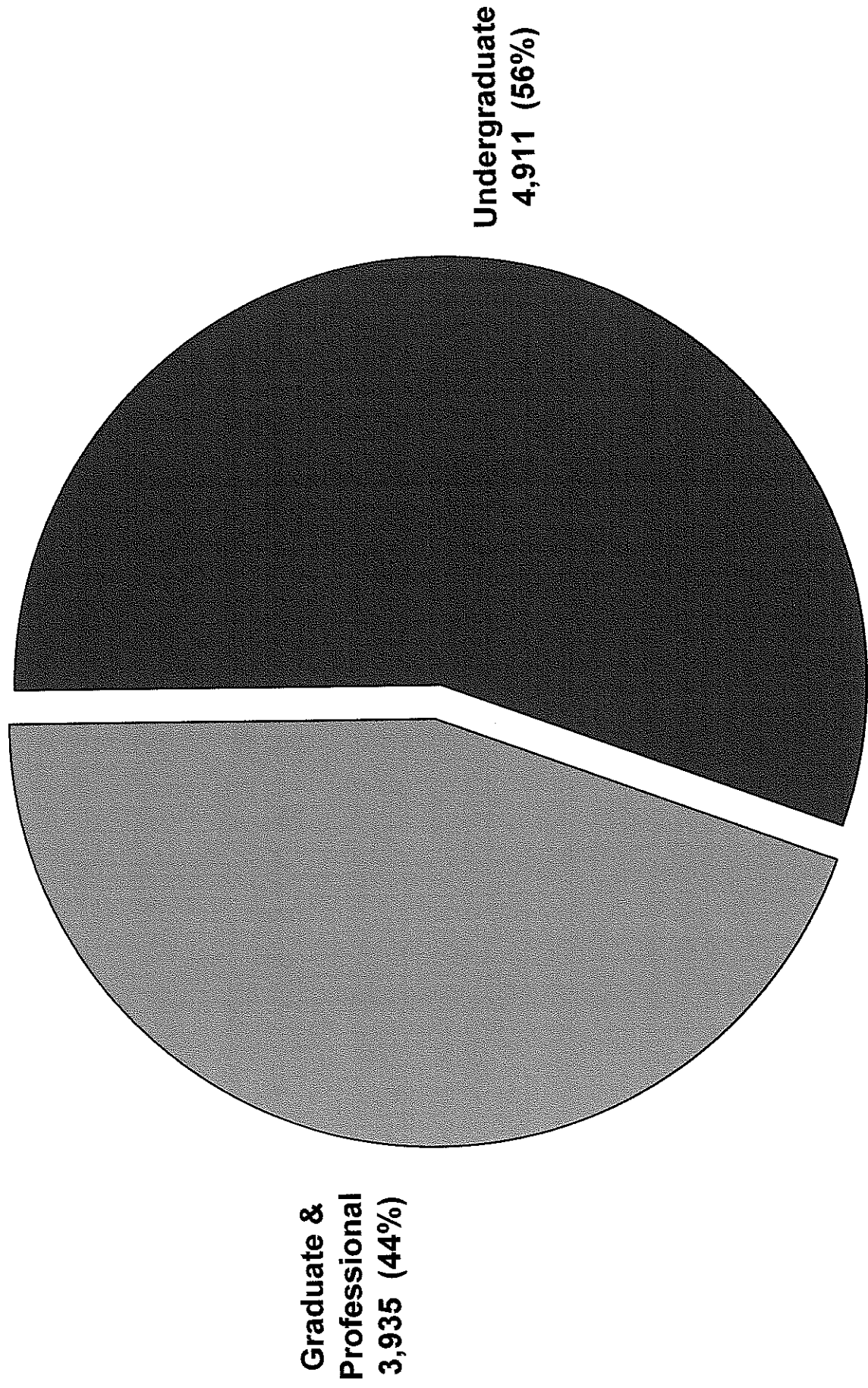
# Total Aid Distributed to All Students, by Source 2002-2003 In Millions



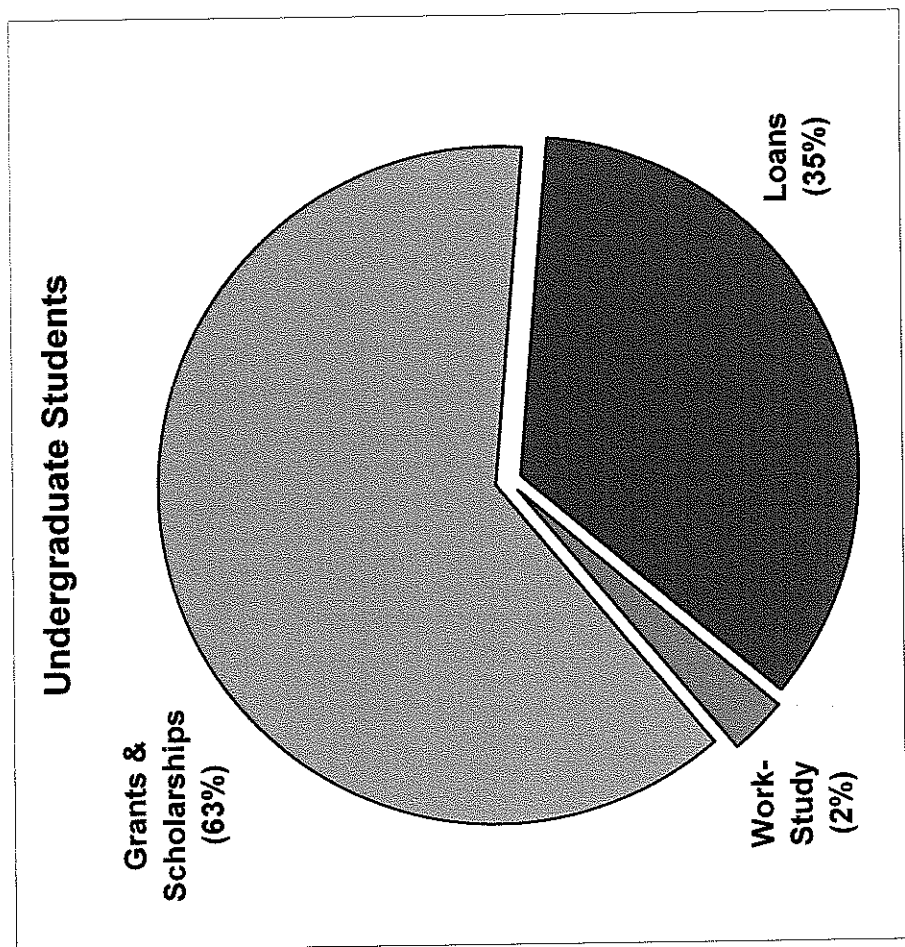
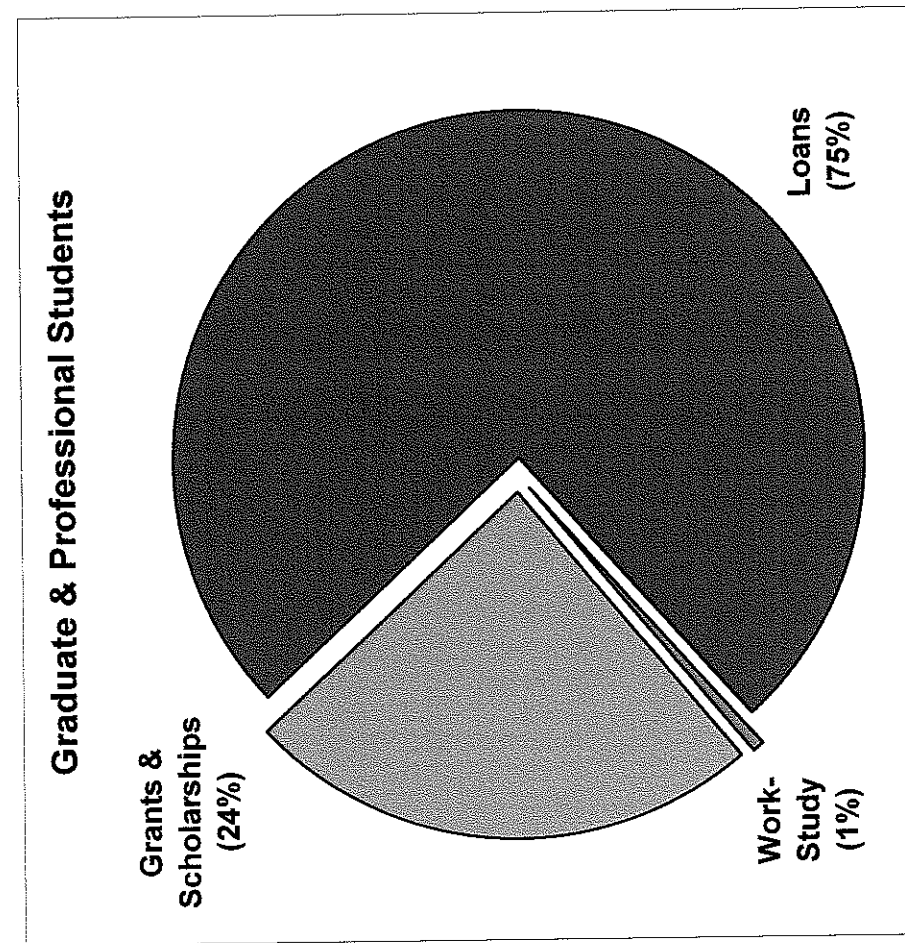


# **All Students Receiving Need-Based Aid 2002-2003**

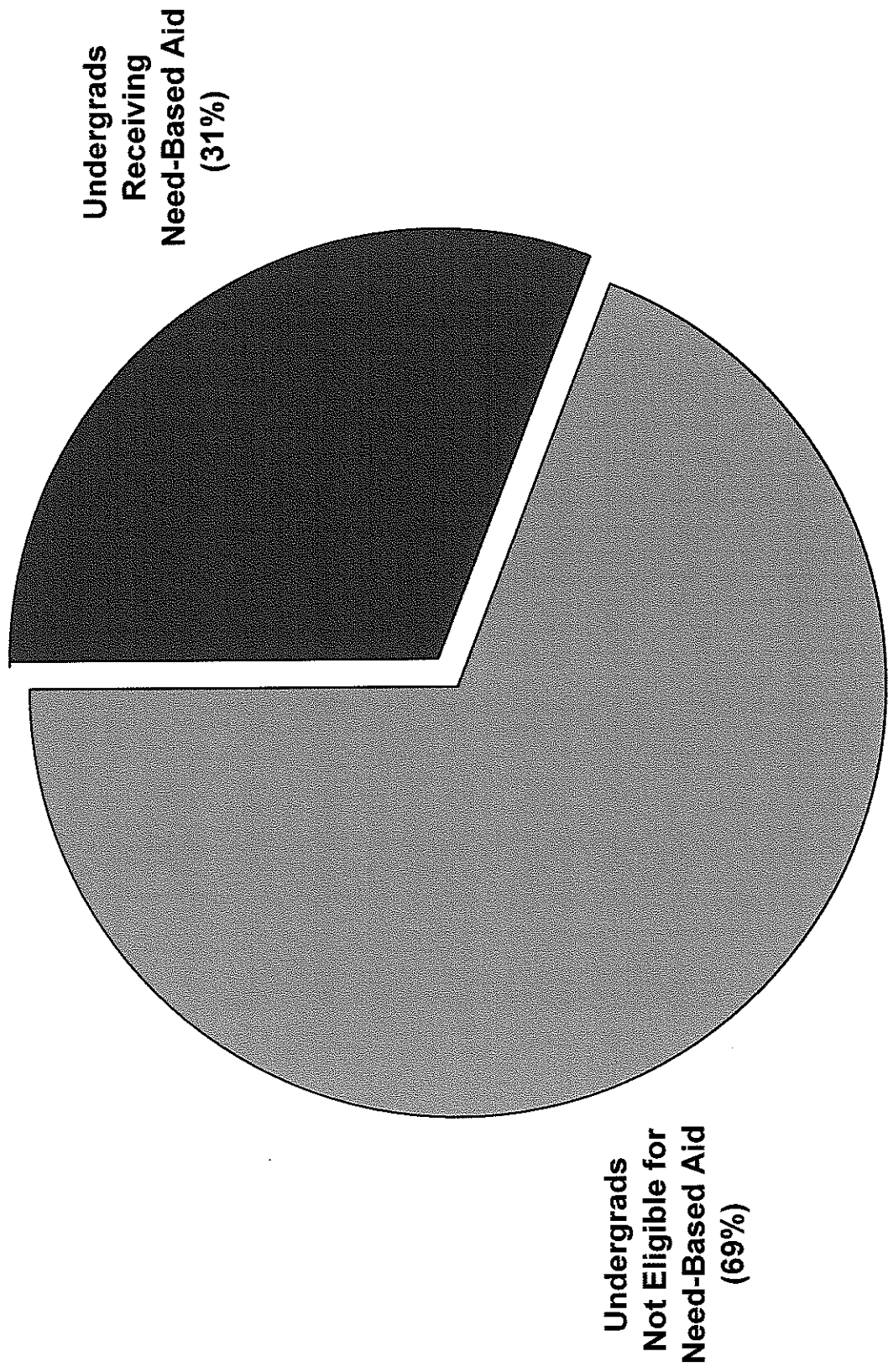
# Need-Based Aid Distributed to Students, by Type 2002-2003



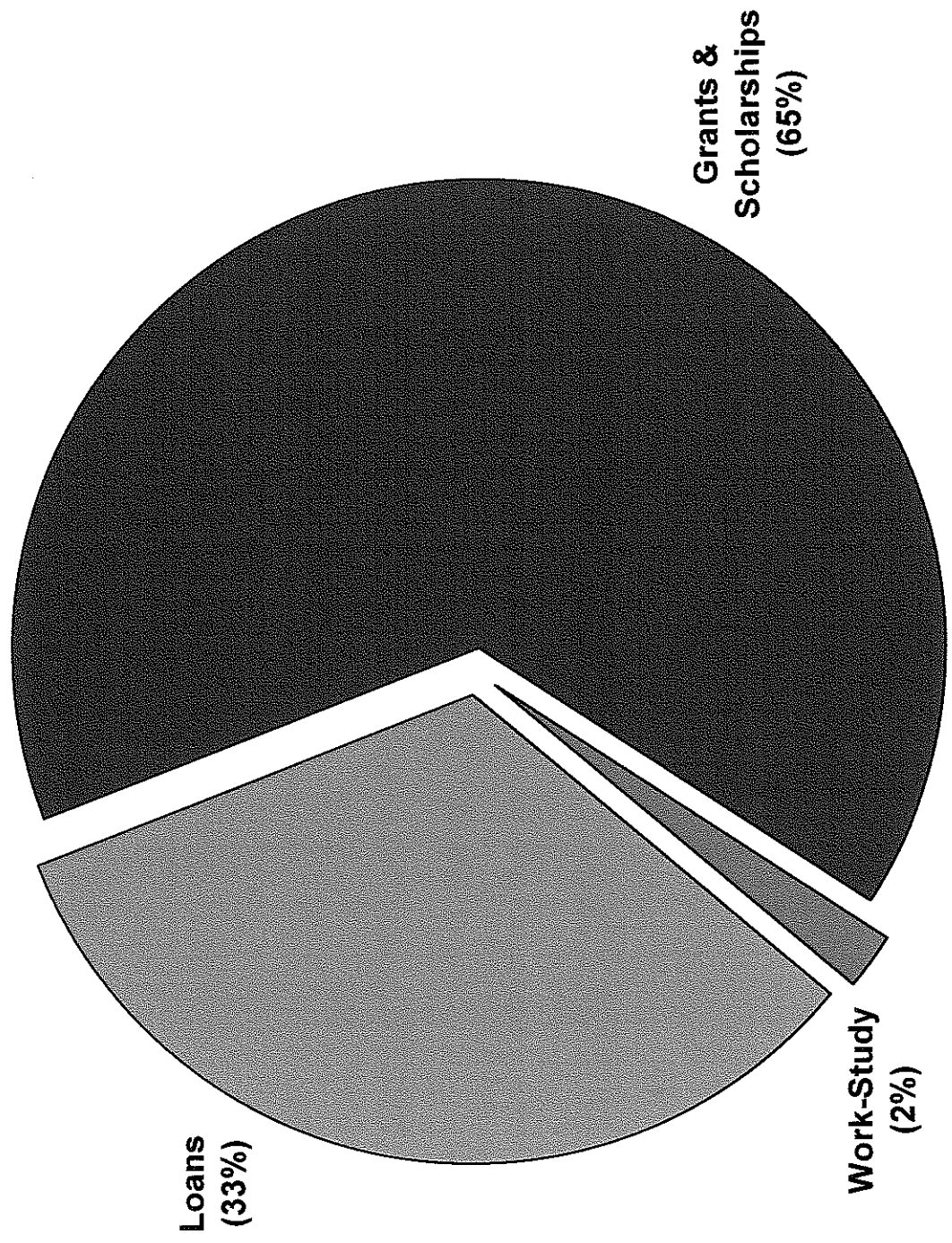
# Percent of All Undergraduate Students Receiving Need-Based Aid 2002-2003

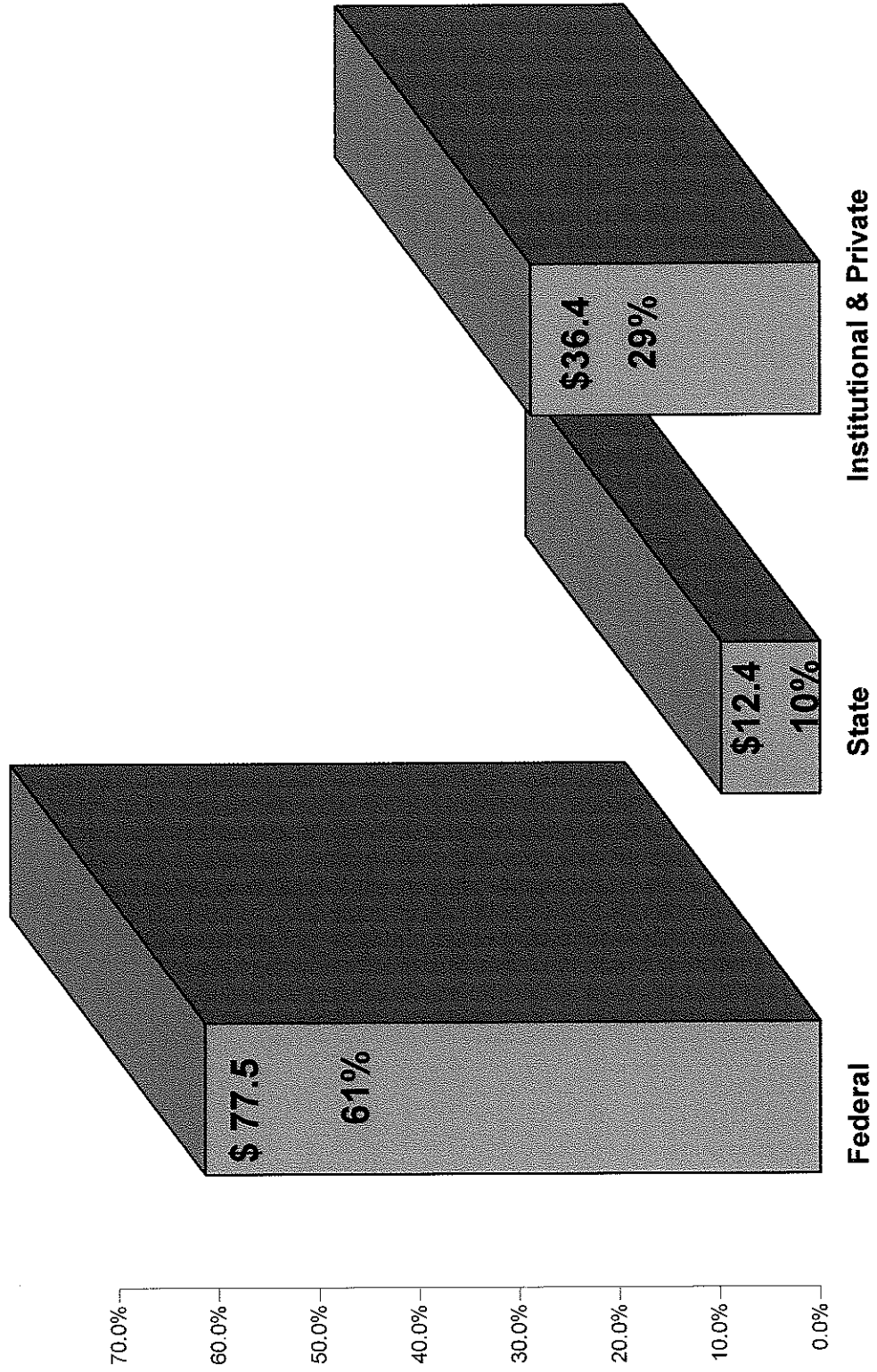

# Typical Financial Aid Package for Aid-Eligible Freshman Applying By March 1st 2002-2003

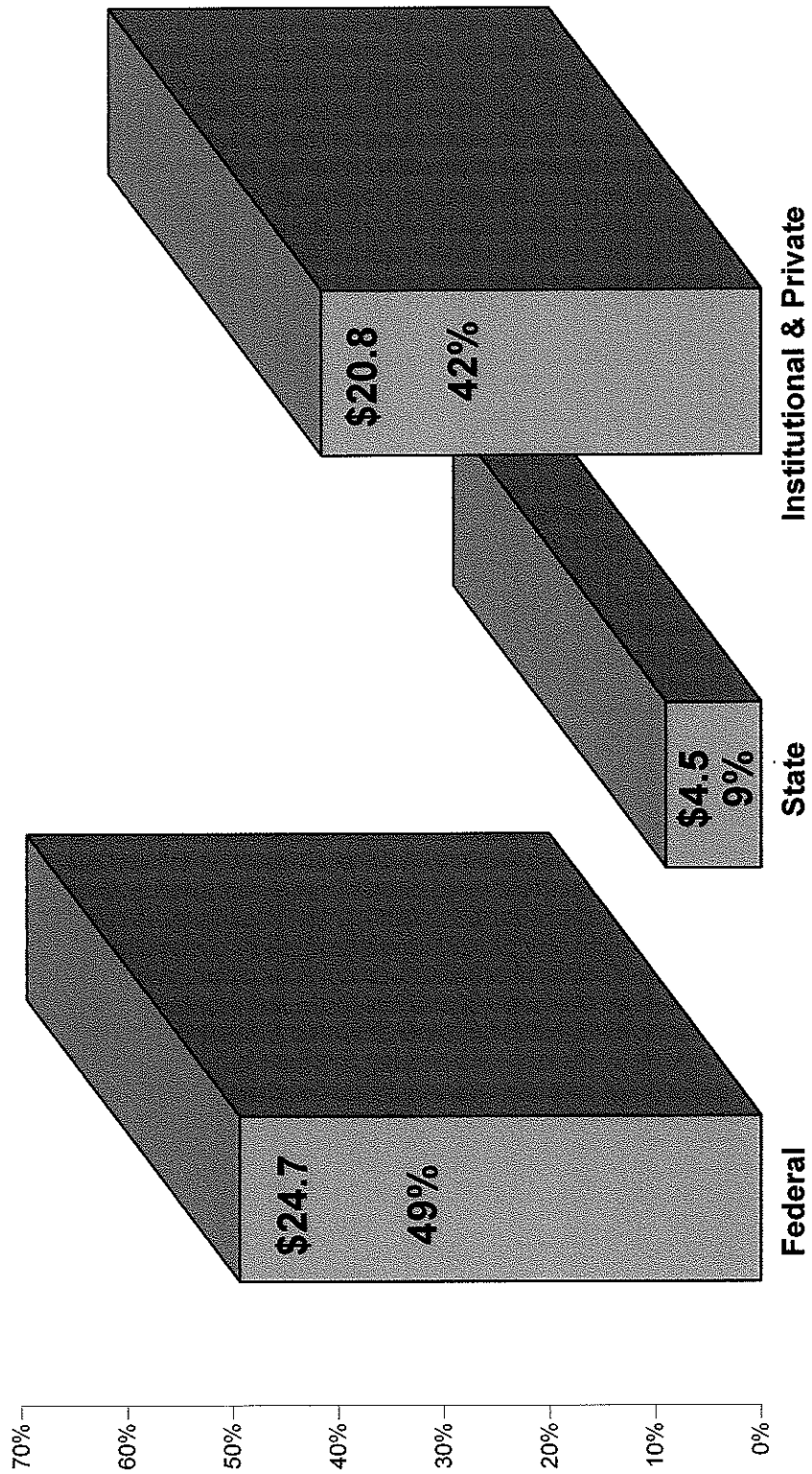


# Need-Based Aid Distributed to All Students, by Source 2002-2003 In Millions

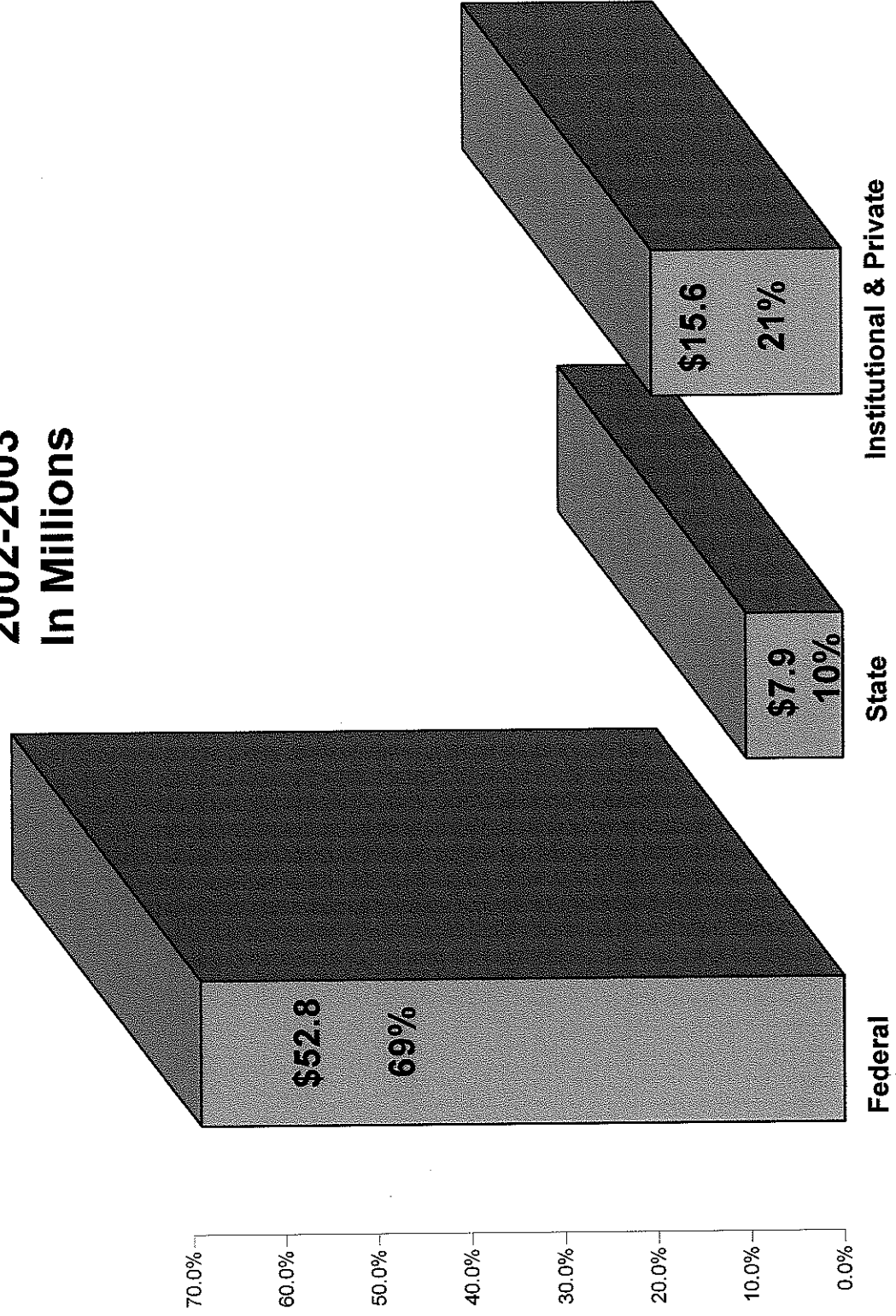




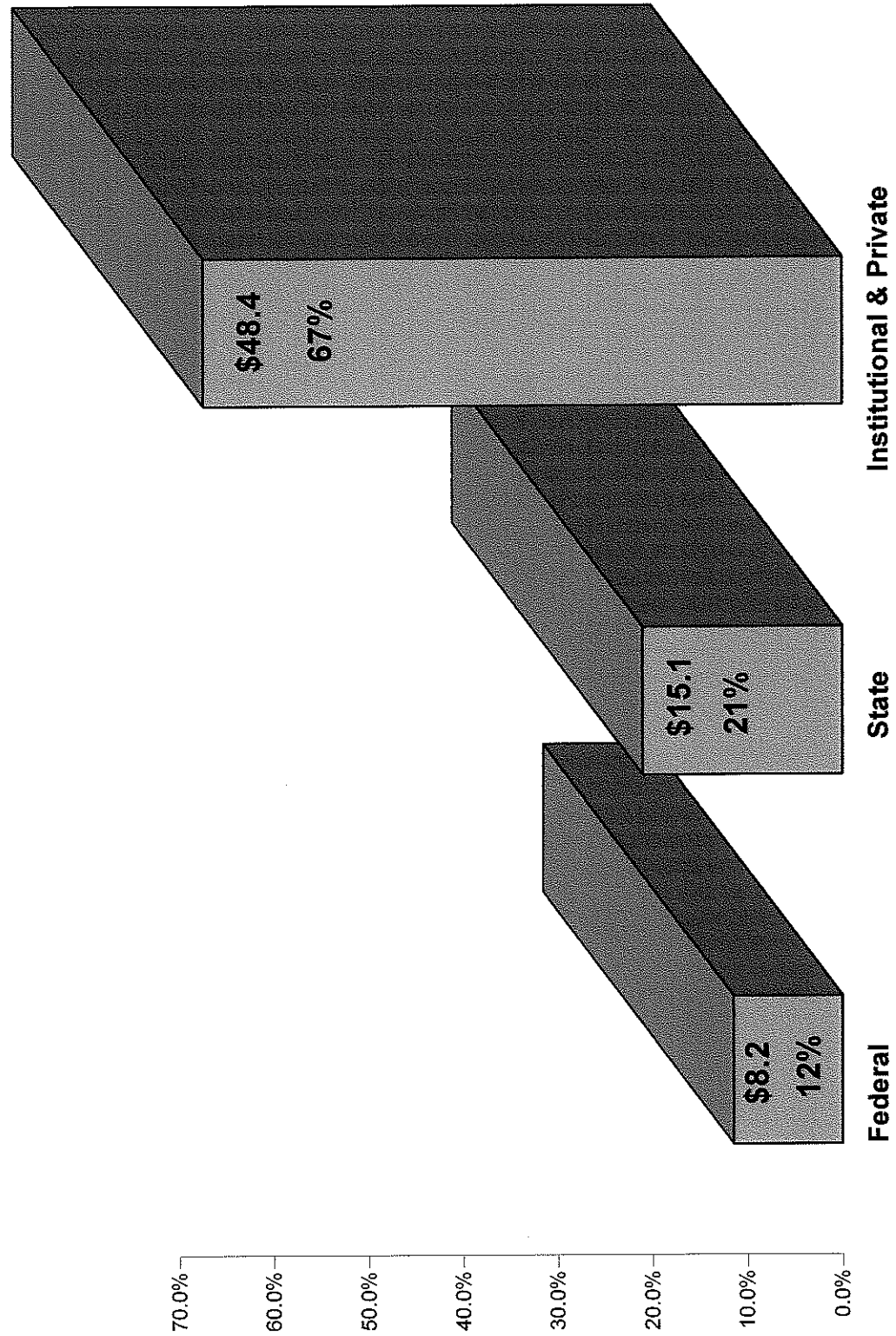
# Need-Based Aid Distributed to Undergraduates, by Source 2002-2003 In Millions



# Need-Based Aid Distributed to Graduate/Professional Students, by Source 2002-2003 In Millions

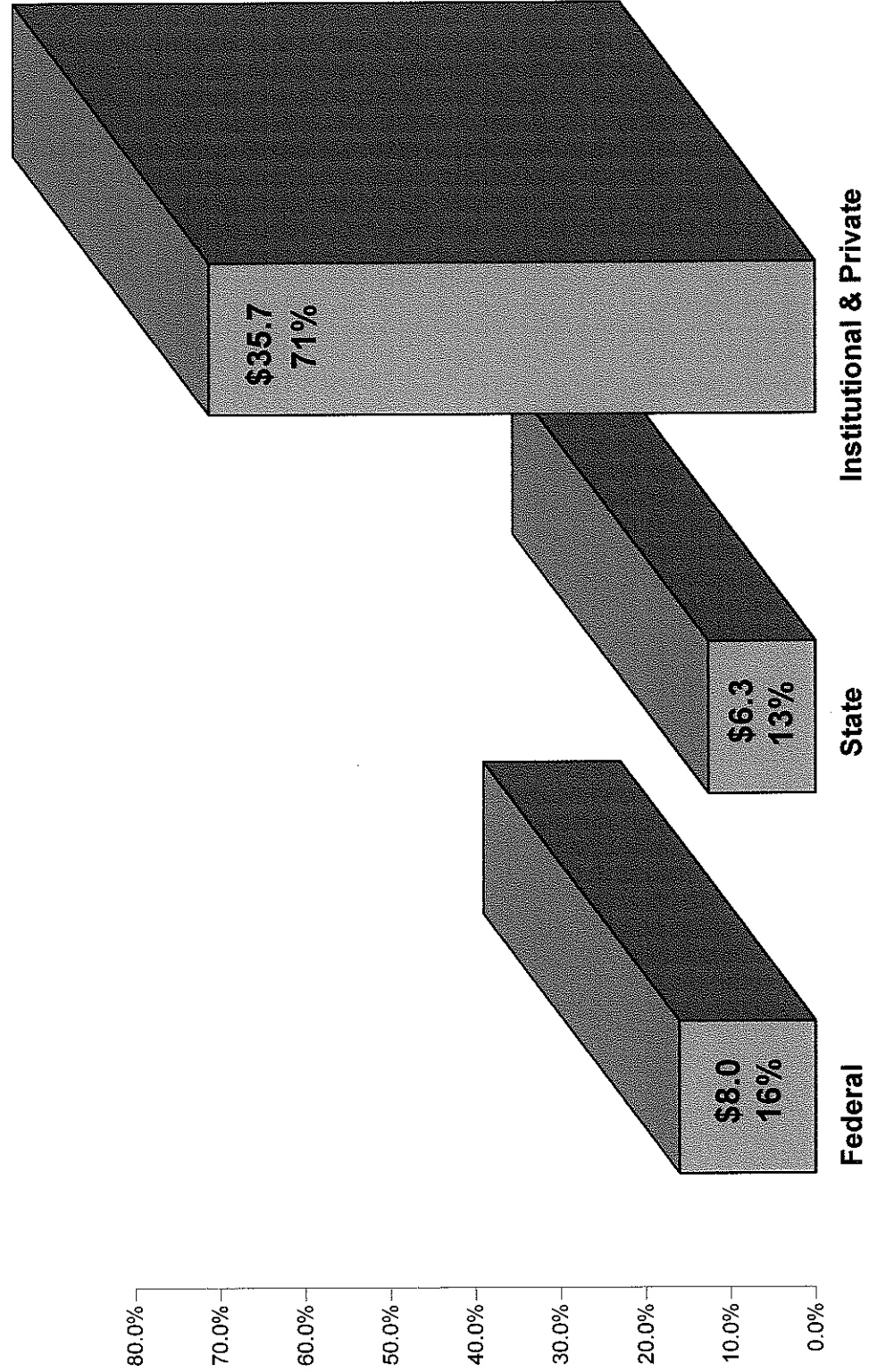


# Gift Aid Distributed to All Students, by Source 2002-2003

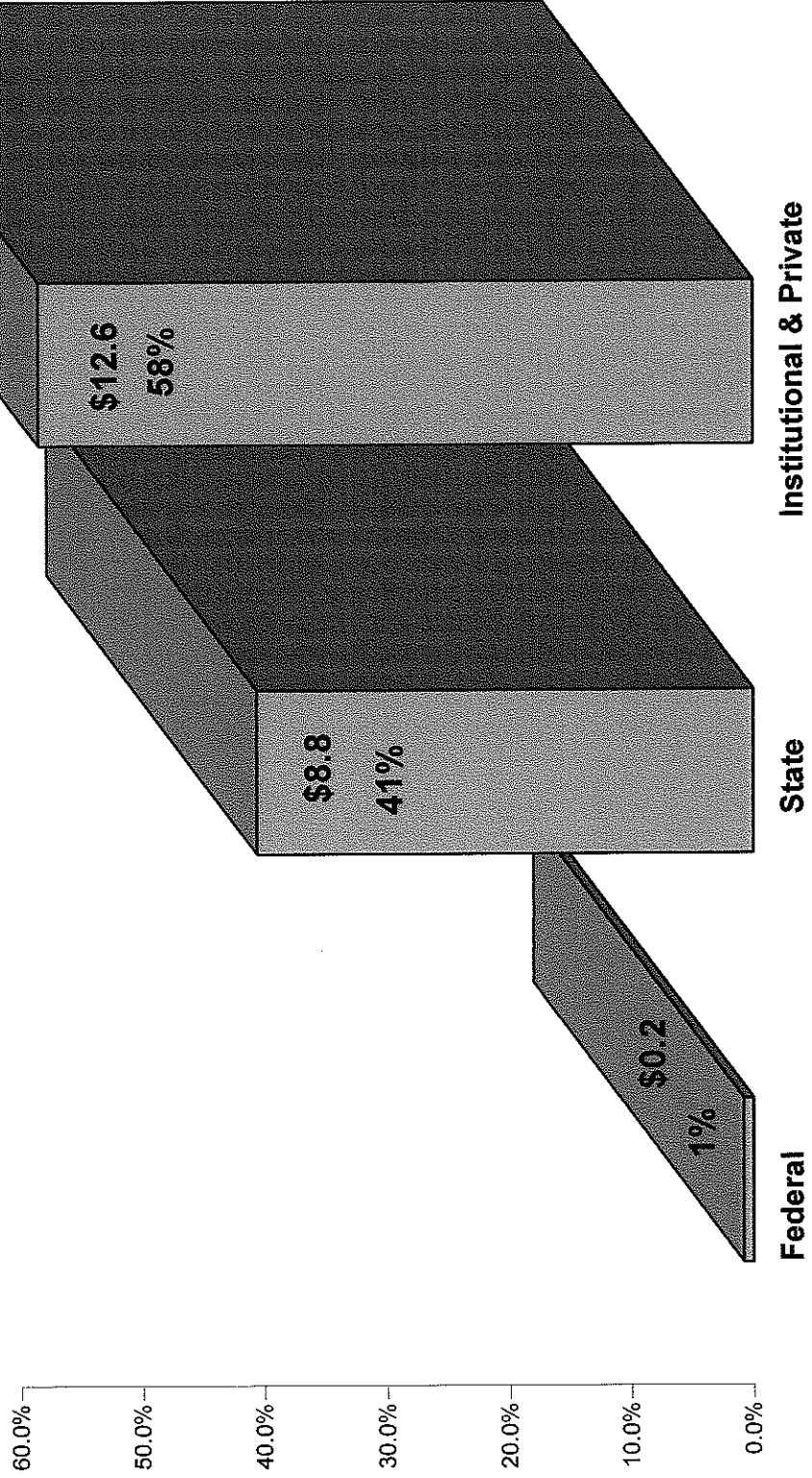




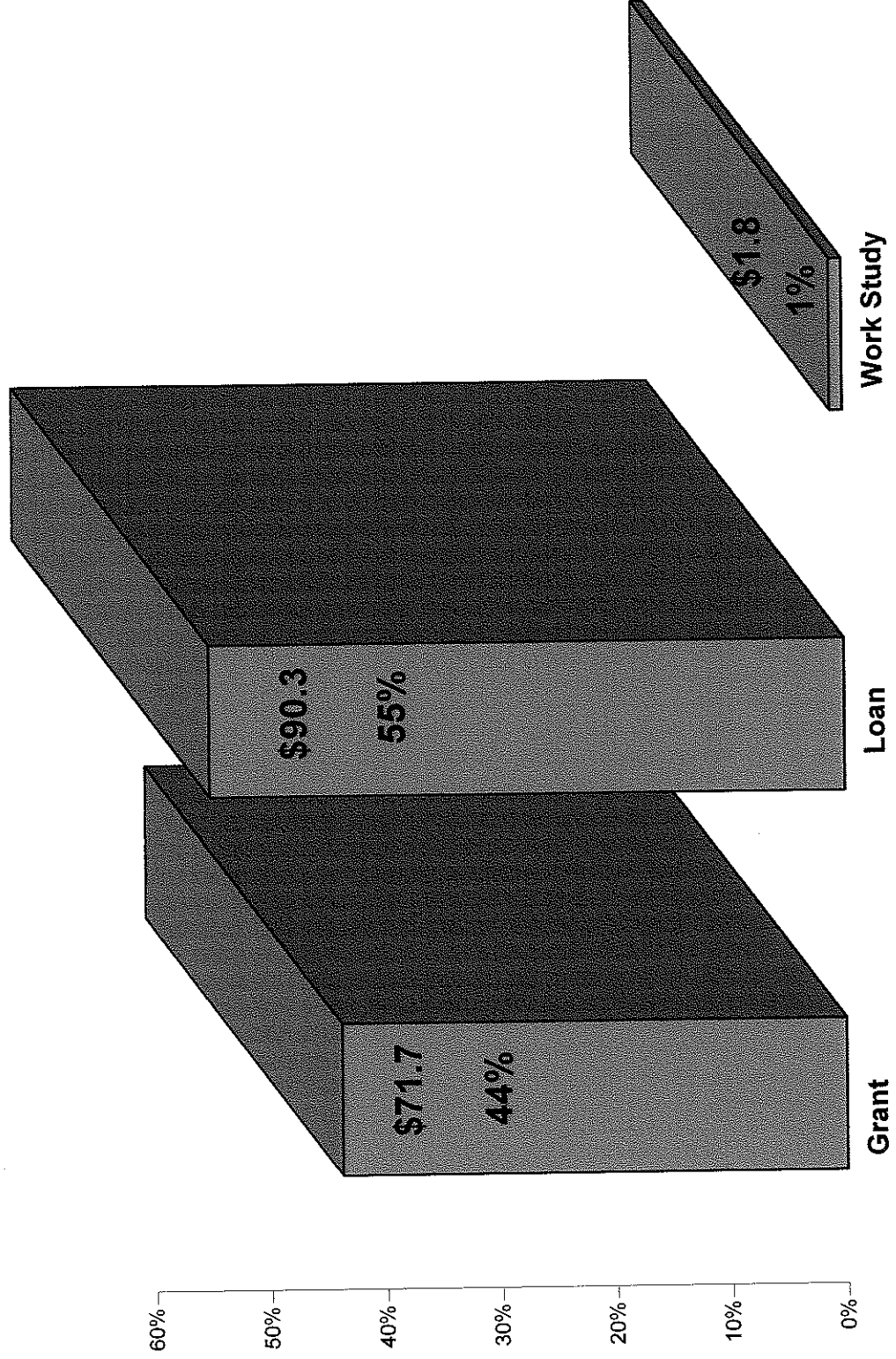
# Gift Aid Distributed to Undergraduates, by Source 2002-2003 In Millions

# **Total Aid Distributed to All Students, by Type** **2002-2003** **In Millions**

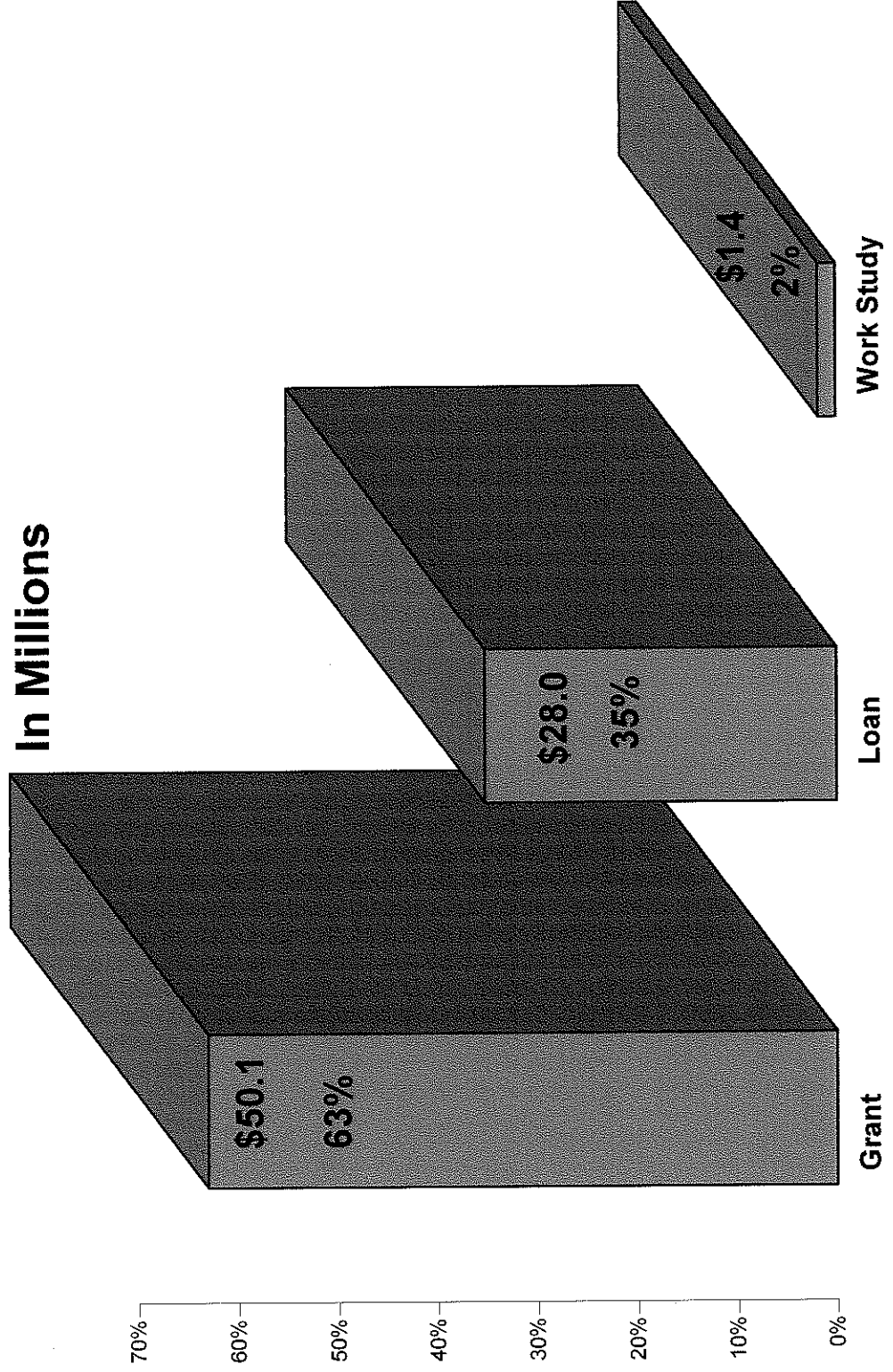

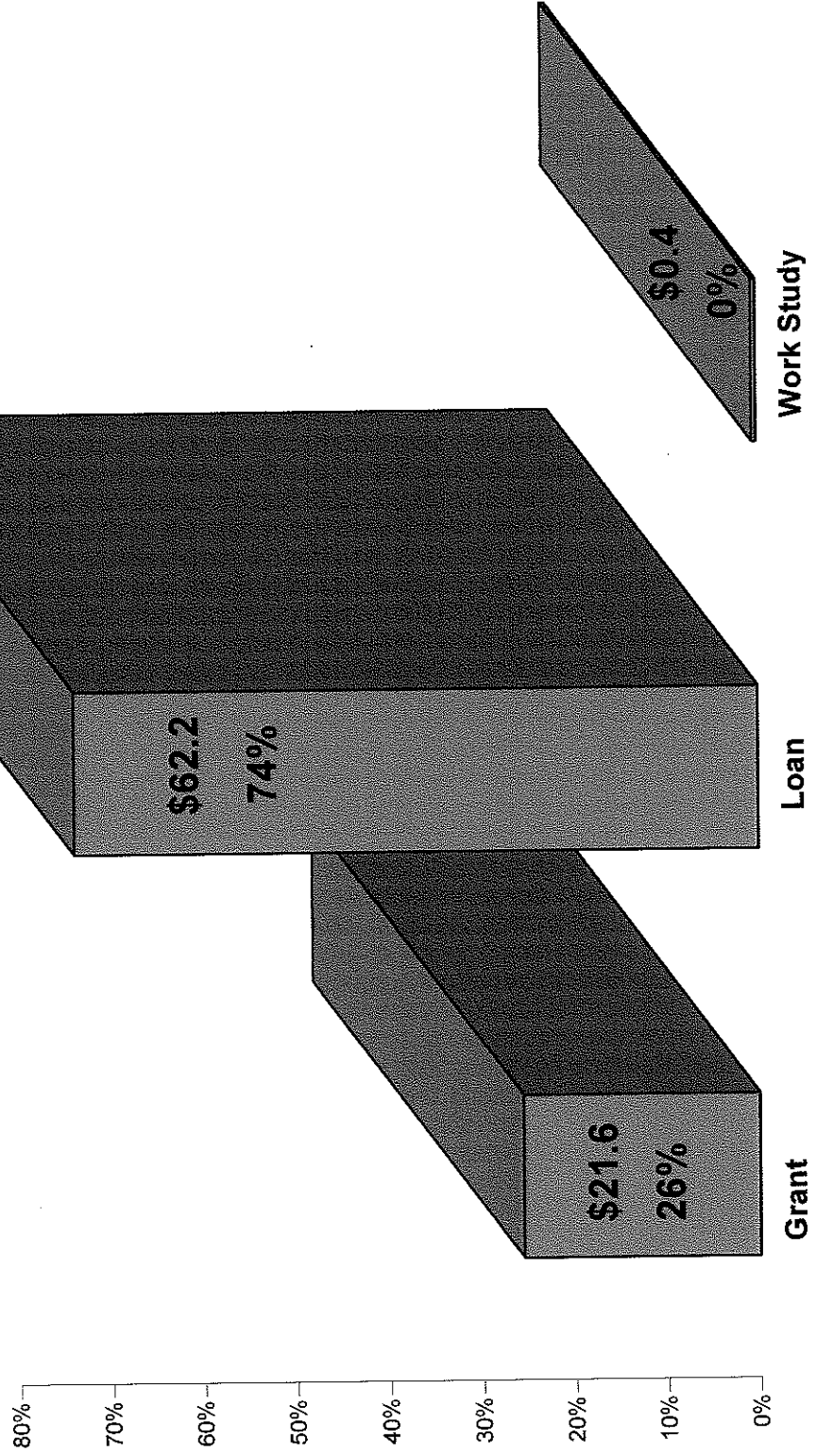

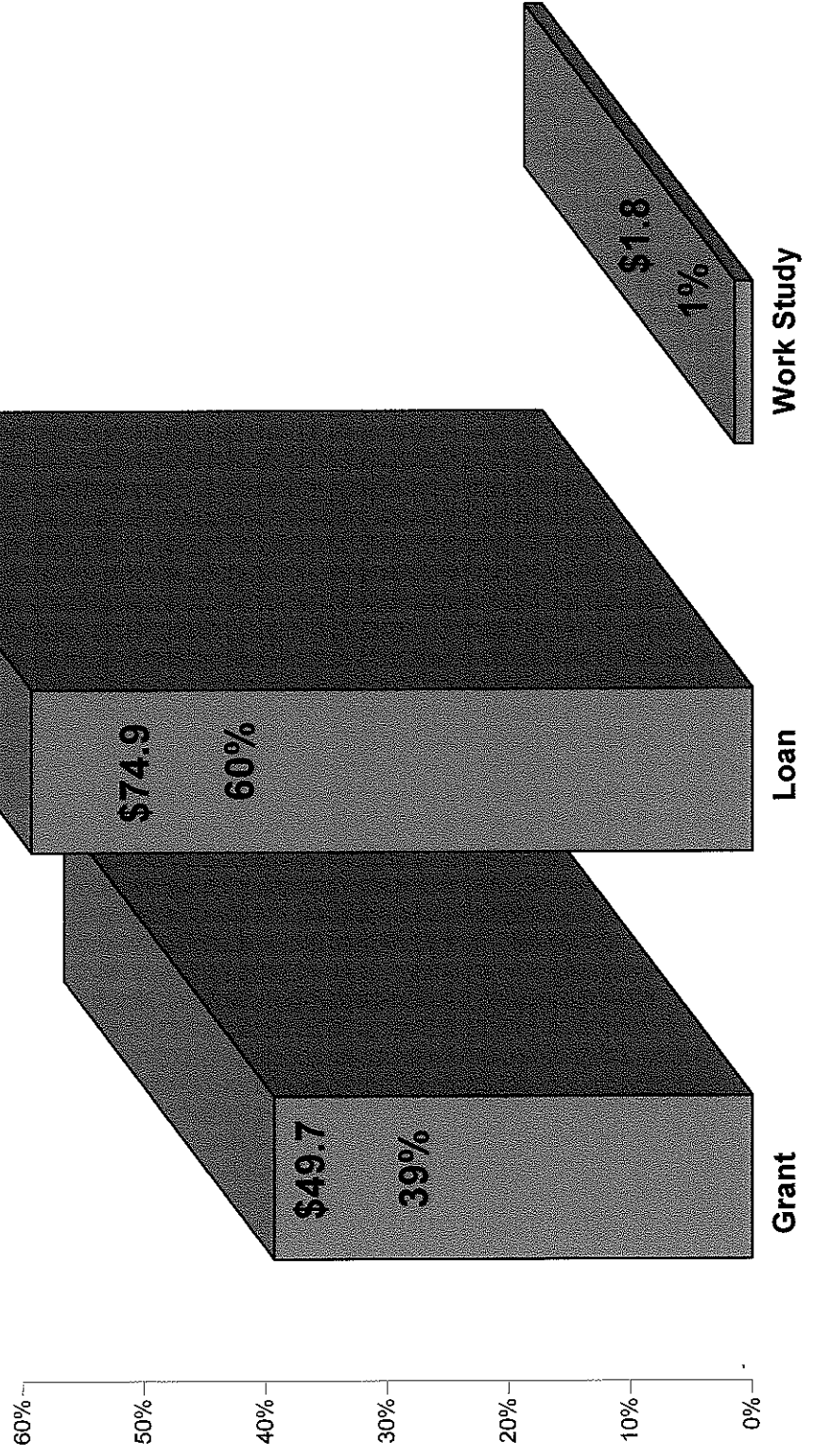

# **Total Aid Distributed to Graduate/Professional Students, by Type 2002-2003 In Millions**

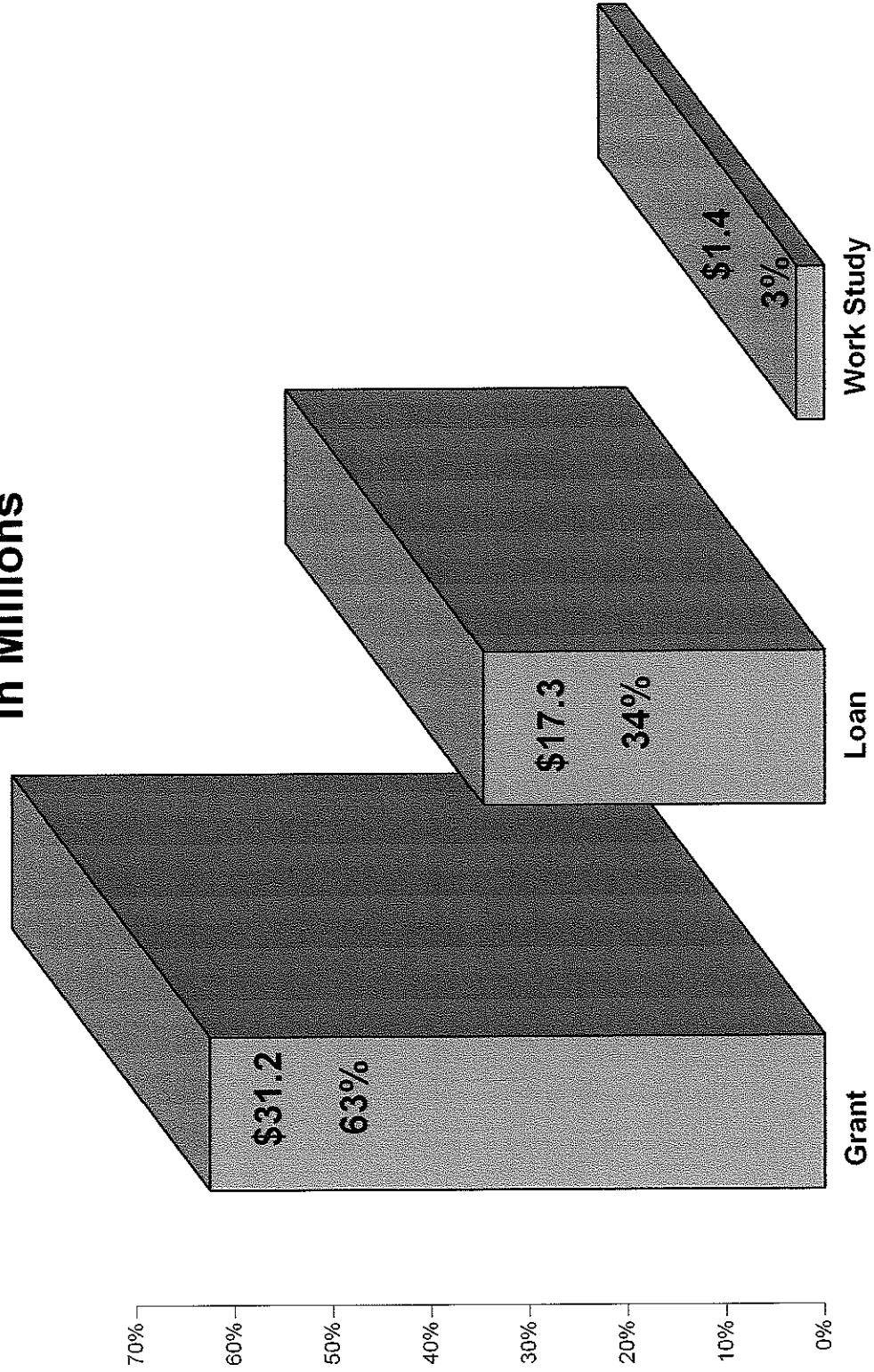


# Need-Based Aid Distributed to All Students, by Type 2002-2003 In Millions

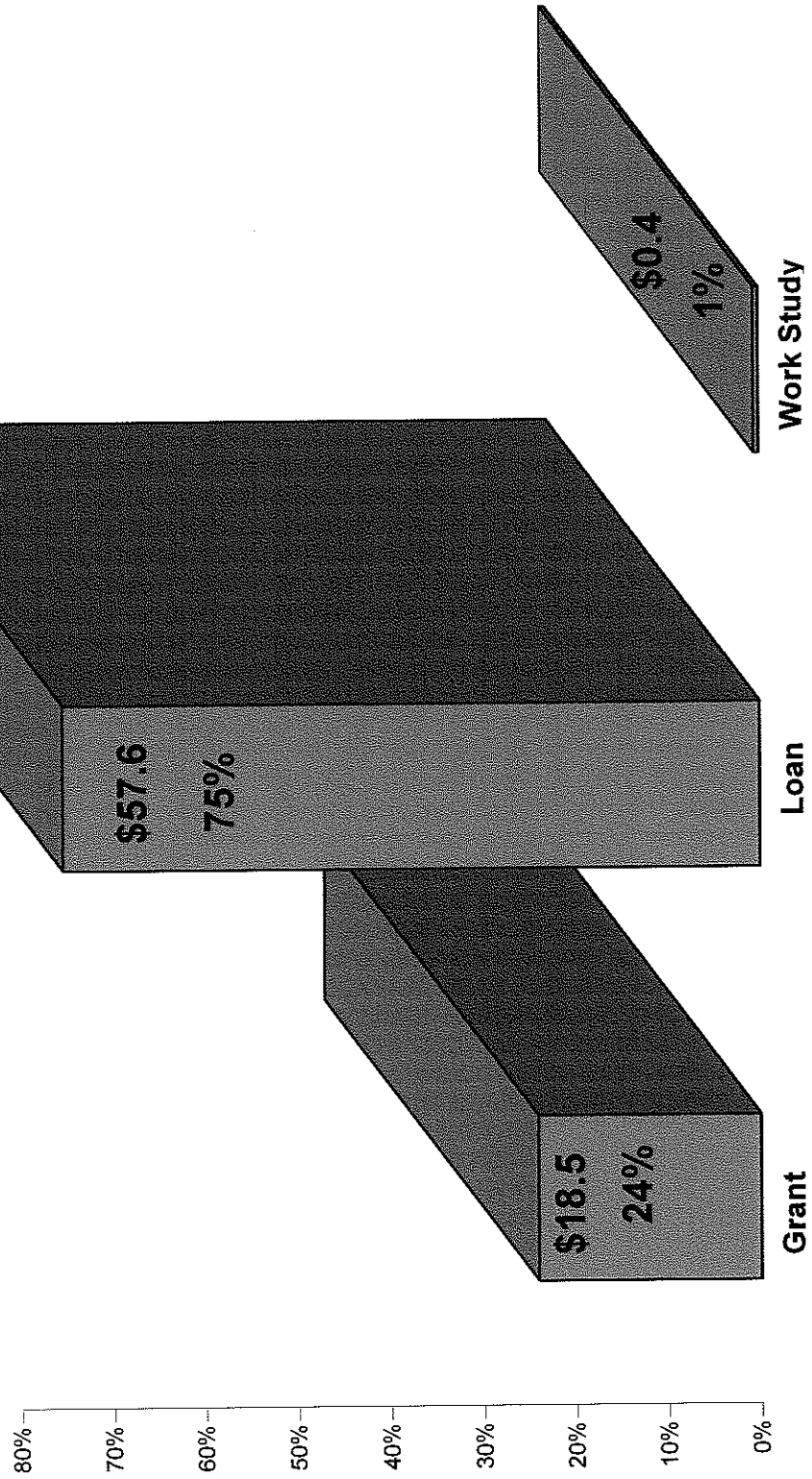




# Need-Based Aid Distributed to Undergraduate Students, by Type 2002-2003 In Millions

## **JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE FACULTY COUNCIL**

**February 13, 2004**

The Faculty Council of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill convened at 3:00 p.m. in the Pleasants Family Assembly Room in the Wilson Library. The following 57 members of the Council attended: Admiora, Ammerman, Arnold, Bachenheimer, Bane, Bouldin, Bowen, Burford, Cairns, Daye, Elter, Elvers, Foley, Givre, Gollop, Granger, Heenan, Holmgren, Howell, Kjervik, Klebanow, Kramer, Langbauer, Leonard, Lohr, McGraw, Miller, Morris-Natschke, Nicholas, Nonini, Orthner, Owen, Pardun, Parikh, Pisano, Poole, Porto, Reisner, Renner, Rock, Rogers, Rowan, Salmon, Schkauer, Shea, Simpson, Jay Smith, Straughan, Strauss, Tauchen, Tobin, Toews, Watson, Weinberg, Winkler, Wolford, and Yankaskas.

In his remarks, Chancellor Moeser:

- Reported that the Board of Governors had postponed a vote on campus-based tuition proposals that were to have been considered at its meeting earlier today.
- Read a portion of a letter from Brad Wilson, Chair of the Board of Governors, making a strong case for additional funding for the UNC System, whether that funding comes from tuition increases or additional funding through the state budget (see Appendix A).
- Reported on a trip he had made with a delegation of faculty and staff to a conference on diversity at the University of Texas at Austin. Attending from Carolina were Chancellor Moeser; Prof. William Darity; Director of Minority Affairs Archie Ervin; Prof. Arturo Escobar; Prof. Sue Estroff; Exec. Assoc. Provost Bernadette Gray-Little; Assoc. Dean of the Graduate School Sandra Hoeflich; and Director of Undergraduate Admissions Jerome Lucido. Prof. Charles Daye had intended to attend but was indisposed at the last minute.
- Announced that Exec. Assoc. Provost Bernadette Gray-Little has been appointed Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, effective April 1.

In response to a question from Prof. Steven Bachenheimer (Microbiology), Chancellor Moeser said that the contract now being negotiated between the ACC and television networks for broadcast of conference football games will include a specific provision that there will be no Thursday night football games in Chapel Hill.

In response to a question from Prof. Ed Halloran (Nursing), Chancellor Moeser said that the administration is attempting to reallocate funds from available sources, such as vacant positions, to free up additional funding for salary increases, but, he emphasized, this strategy cannot bridge the gap. Additional funding from tuition increases and state appropriations is essential.

In his remarks, Provost Shelton:

- Reported that efforts are underway to assemble focus groups from across campus to aid in development of a survey instrument that will be distributed to the entire faculty for the purpose of gathering information on the problem of faculty retention.
- Said that he intends to initiate an internal search to fill the position of executive associate provost vacated by Prof. Gray-Little's appointment as Dean of the College, and asked for nominations from the faculty.

Prof. Judith Wegner, Chair of the Faculty, said that she is assembling focus groups of department chairs to discuss the faculty retention survey. She complimented Chancellor Moeser for his recent decision not to

accept a salary increase offered by President Broad to all System chancellors, and thanked everyone who participated in the Chancellor's Task Force on the Work Place. Chancellor Moeser remarked that perhaps the best thing to come out of the Task Force's work was a sense of the part of the staff that faculty do care about problems faced by the staff.

Exec. Assoc. Provost Bernadette Gray-Little led a discussion of topics that had been suggested for the Quality Enhancement component of the up-coming SACS reaccreditation study.

Prof. Charles Daye, Chair of the Committee on Scholarships, Awards, and Student Aid, presented the committee's annual report, assisted by Shirley Ort, Assoc. Provost and Director of Scholarships and Student Aid.

Prof. Karen Gil, Senior Associate Dean of the College and Chair of the Advisory Committee on Undergraduate Admissions, presented the committee's annual report, assisted by Dr. Jerome Lucido, Vice Provost and Director of Undergraduate Admissions.

On motion of Prof. Richard Andrews, Chair of the Committee on Honorary Degrees and Special Awards, the Council went into closed session to consider nominees for honorary degrees.

Prof. Andrews nominated one additional person to be awarded an honorary degree at Commencement 2004. The nominee was approved. See Appendix B, which will be closed to public inspection until honorary degree recipients for 2004 are publicly announced.

Prof. Andrews nominated five persons to be awarded honorary degrees at Commencement 2005. Each nominee was approved. See Appendix C, which will be closed to public inspection until honorary degree recipients for 2005 are publicly announced.

Its business having concluded, the Council adjourned at 5:00 pm.

## Appendix A

### **Extracts from Remarks by Brad Wilson, Chair of the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina, on January 16, 2004.**

I'm convinced....that the quality of a UNC education is now at risk. I'm equally convinced that low tuition without high quality is no bargain. So this tuition debate is really about whether this Board is going to permit the continued erosion of the quality of public higher education in this State.....

New national statistics released since our last meeting show that in 2003-04 UNC System tuition and fee charges for in-state students actually became more affordable relative to peer institutions across the nation. For example, for comprehensive universities only six states reported lower costs than North Carolina. We also fared better among flagship institutions. These conclusions are consistent with the recent study by the State Education Assistance Authority, which concluded that despite rising tuition, this University remains affordable for North Carolina residents. The creation and expansion of the UNC need-based aid [program] is largely responsible for this development. In approving previous campus-based tuition increases, this Board has insisted that adequate need-based aid be set aside to offset the impact of higher tuition on needy North Carolina students.

The quality of a university is built on its faculty and the inability of the governor and the legislature to provide funding for salary increases has put UNC at a growing competitive disadvantage. As we heard yesterday from Dr. Gretchen Bataille, an independent 1998 study found that our campuses would need about \$28 million in additional State support to raise faculty salaries to the competitive benchmark set by the Board of Governors. Since then, we've lost further ground. The tuition sought by our campuses this year to support faculty salaries would not even bring us to the average of our peer institutions. To make matters worse, it would take another \$24 million to provide our faculty with benefits comparable to those at peer institutions. Clearly, we will be hard-pressed to maintain the quality of education that North Carolinians expect and deserve without additional revenues.

We agree with Governor Easley and others that salaries and other basic support for UNC should come from the state's General Fund. While we are hopeful that the state may be in a better fiscal position in 2004, there is little hope that the State can meet all our needs in another tight budget year. This will be an important issue of discussion with the governor and our friends in the General Assembly. This is certain: if North Carolina is to build and strengthen its economy, it cannot afford to lessen its historic commitment to affordable access to The University, and it cannot afford to let the quality of a UNC education erode further. Low tuition without high quality is no bargain.

## Appendix B

### **Nomination Presented by the Committee on Honorary Degrees and Special Awards for an Honorary Degree to be Presented to the Commencement Speaker at Commencement 2004**

#### **Julius LeVonne Chambers**

Born in Mt. Gilead, NC in 1936, veteran civil rights lawyer, activist, and educator Julius Chambers was influenced by the racial intolerance he saw growing up in a small, rural community east of Charlotte. He graduated summa cum laude from NC Central University with a B.A. in history and was president of the student body. He then earned an M.A. in history at the University of Michigan and began law school at Carolina in 1959, where he became the first African-American to be chosen as editor-in-chief of the Law Review. He graduated first in his class in 1962 and went on to earn his LL.M. degree from Columbia in 1964. Chambers became the first intern with the new NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund in 1963. In 1963 he opened his own one-person law practice in Charlotte, which eventually became the first integrated law firm in North Carolina. Together with his

partners, James E. Ferguson II and Adam Stein, this firm is credited with influencing more landmark state and federal legislation in school desegregation, employment, and voting rights than any other in the United States. In 1984 Chambers left his firm to become director-counsel of the LDF, where he continued the fight for civil rights legislation and affirmative action programs. Remaining devoted to education, Chambers returned to his alma mater, N.C. Central, as chancellor for eight years. Today, Chambers heads Carolina's Center for Civil Rights. The Center fosters empirical and analytical research, sponsors student inquiry and activities, and convenes faculty visiting scholars, policy advocates, and practicing attorneys to confront legal and social issues of greatest concern to racial and ethnic minorities, to the poor, and to other potential beneficiaries of civil rights advances.

In recognition of a lifetime career devoted to the advancement of civil rights for African-Americans and other minorities, the faculty recommends Julius LeVonne Chambers for the degree of Doctor of Laws, to be awarded at Commencement 2004 when Professor Chambers will deliver the Commencement Address.

The faculty also ask that the Board of Trustees, in this exceptional case, waive the normal prohibition against granting honorary degrees to Carolina faculty, staff or trustees until two years after separation from the University.
