

WENDELL HOLMES STEPHENSON, Professor of History and Chairman of the Division of Social Sciences of Tulane University of Louisiana, holds the bachelor's and master's degrees from Indiana University and the Ph. D. from the University of Michigan. Before assuming his present position, he taught in Indiana University, the University of Kentucky, and Louisiana State University. In 1951 he was Fulbright Visiting Professor in the University of Birmingham, England, and in the recent past he has taught in the summer schools of Duke and Carolina. Teacher, scholar, and author of numerous books, articles and reviews in the field of southern history, he was founder and first editor of the Journal of Southern History, and now edits the Mississippi Valley Historical Review. Few men have done more to advance the cause of historical scholarship in the South, through his stimulating teaching; through his inspiring leadership as president of the Southern Historical Association, and of the Agricultural History Society, and as a member of the Council of the Mississippi Valley Historical Association; and finally through his own writings, his research, and his wise editorial direction of such notable series as the ten-volume Southern Biography series and a ten-volume History of the South. Interpreting the past for the future, inspiring the present generation with stirring accounts of their ancestors, instilling the wisdom of example by showing, as Francis Bacon said of Machiavelli, not what men ought to do but what they do, he does credit to a noble profession; and in honoring him the University pays tribute to his talent.
