

Alternates —

- Alternates are asked to serve only if an elected member resigns or goes on leave

Modes of Action

- INFO items are presented to the Council for information only.
- DISC items are presented for discussion; no formal vote is needed
- ACT items are presented for formal action



Participation

- Any General Faculty member may brir matters to the Council for considerationand may participate in discussion
- Other members of the University community may attend as observers except during closed sessions held to approve honorary degrees and awards

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Action Item Procedures

- Any Council member, whether ex officio or elected, may make motions
- Only elected members (including ECFC members) may vote on Action items

Principles of Parliamentary Procedure

- Council must have authority to take any action it purports to take
- Council can act only in a valid meeting
- Proper notice of the meeting and all action items must be given
- A quorum must be present to act

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- There must be a question before the Council that is capable of being answered yes or no
- Only one question ("main motion") can be pending at the same time
- The question must be decided by a vote ■ There must be an opportunity for debate

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■ To end debate and vote immediately on the pending matter (the "Previous Question") ■ To table (i.e., to kill the pending matter To postpone consideration to another time ■ To refer the pending matter to committee ■ To amend the text of the Main Motion ■ The Main Motion is the ultimate action to be taken, e.g., to adopt a resolution ■ Subsidiary Motions are procedures to ■ A question is decided by a majority of ■ Presumption is that the body will not act without actually voting on it) another move from one stage of consideration to perfect the text of the Main Motion or to the votes cast Principles of Parliamentary Procedure **Common Subsidiary Motions** Negative vote implies disapproval, but Motions must be in the active mode Decision not to vote does not imply a position on the merits Types of Motions



Resolution 2000-12. Amending the Faculty Code

be able to complete a current term. Resolution 2000-12 amends the Faculty Code to incorporate this change in the tenure regulations. The resolution also changes a provision that now requires the secretary of the faculty to have regulations. Instead, the regulations require that members of the Hearings Committee have permanent tenure "when retirement to resign from the committee. The trustees incorporated in our Faculty Code, has the effect of requiring a member of the Hearings Committee who enters phased Resolution 2000-5 which requested the Board of Trustees to remove from the tenure regulations a provision that required members of the Faculty Hearings Committee to have permanent tenure. That provision, which is now amendment is recommended by the Committee on University Government. On April 28, 2000, the Council adopted Prof. Ferrell presented Resolution 2000-12 entitled "Amending the Faculty Code to Allow Faculty in Phased Retirement, If Otherwise Qualified, to Serve on All Faculty Committees and as Secretary of the Faculty." The proposal is to simply drop that requirement and trust the judgment of the Advisory Committee elected." Thus, faculty members in phased retirement are not eligible for election to the Hearings Committee but will have now removed that requirement from the

Resolution 2000-12 was adopted unanimously on first reading. As required by the Faculty Code, it must be adopted a second time before taking effect. That will be put to a vote at the October meeting of the General Faculty The full text of Resolution 2000-12 will be found on the Faculty Governance website.
